

Alan R. Hinman, M.D., M.P.H. is with The Task Force for Child Survival and Development, a program affiliated with the Carter Center and Emory University. At the Task Force, he serves as principal investigator for All Kids Count, a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation-funded program seeking to foster development of integrated preventive health information systems. He is also a consultant to for the PARTNERS TB Control Program, a program funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, which addresses multidrug-resistant tuberculosis in Peru and globally.

Since 1965, Dr. Hinman has been involved in public health programs at the State, national, and international level, primarily working with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). At CDC, he held positions including EIS Officer (1965-1967), Director of the Immunization Division (1977-1988), Director of the National Center for Prevention Services (1988-1995), and Senior Advisor to the Director (1995-1996). In addition, he has worked for the State Health Departments of New York (1970-1975) and Tennessee (1975-1977). Dr. Hinman retired from the U.S. Public Health Service in July 1996, having attained the rank of Assistant Surgeon General. He is the author or co-author of more than 300 scientific publications and holds an appointment as adjunct professor of epidemiology at the Rollins School of Public Health of Emory University.
